MOT	
1	A MOT certificate is normally valid for one year after the date it was issued
2	If you drive without valid MOT, your insurance may be invalidated
3	You can drive without an MOT certificate, when driving to an appointment at an MOT centre
4	A new car needs its first MOT when it's 3 years old
Penalty Points	
5	If you get six penalty points in the first 2 years after you pass your test, you'll have to retake your theory and practical tests
Vehicle Registration Document	
6	A vehicle registration document has the registered keepers name and address
7	The registered keeper is responsible for ensuring the vehicle registration document is updated
8	You must update your vehicle registration certificate when you move to a new house
Insurance	
9	The legal minimum insurance is Third Party Only. This covers damage to other vehicles
10	Before driving someone else's vehicle, you must make sure that the vehicle is insured for you
11	A Cover Note is a document issued before you receive your insurance certificate
12	The maximum fine for driving for riding without insurance is unlimited
13	You must produce your insurance certificate when a police officer asks for it
11	You must have valid insurance before you can tax your car
12	If your insurance policy has an excess of £500, this means you'll have to pay the first £500 of the cost of any claim
SORN	
13	SORN (Statutory Off-Road Notification) is a notification to tell the DVLA that a vehicle isn't being used on the road
14	SORN is valid until the vehicle is sold, scrapped or taxed

Road Tax	
15	You must have valid insurance before you can tax your car
Other	
16	If a police officer asks to see your documents, and you don't have them with you, you must produce them within 7 days
17	You must contact the DVLA when your health affects your driving
18	In order to be able to supervise a learner driver, you need to have had a full licence for 3 years, and be at least 21 years old
